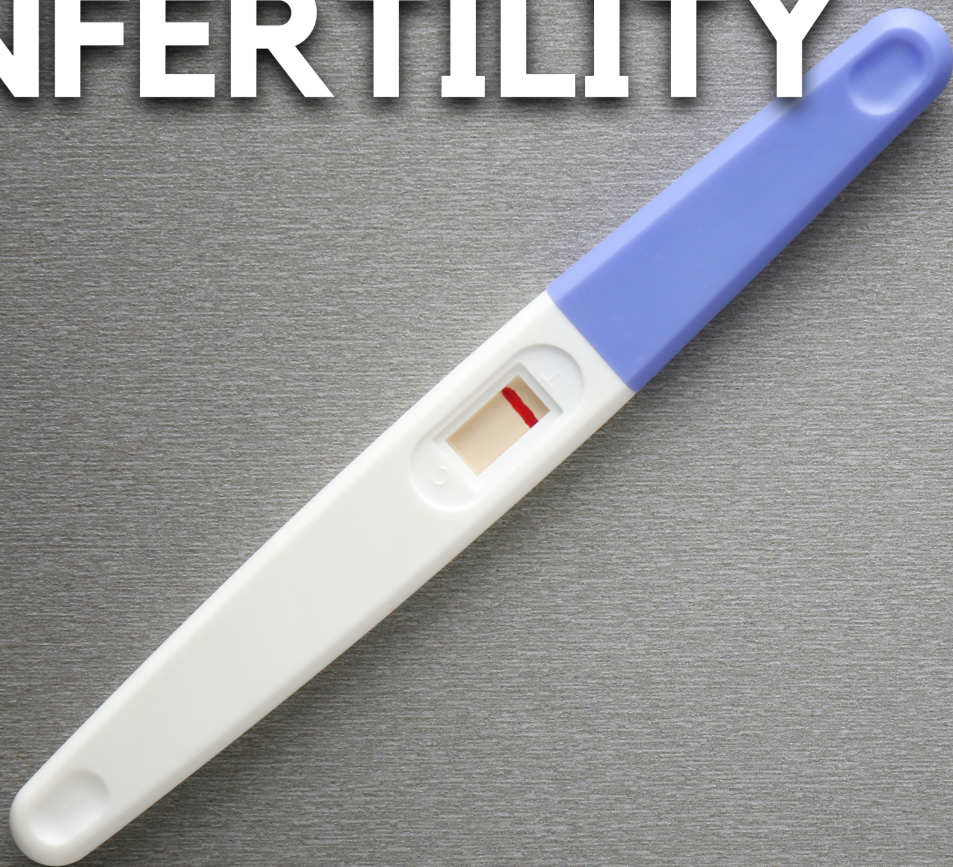


INFERTILITY



The prevalence of infertility in the world is between 10-15%. Among the causes of infertility that can develop due to many reasons, there are genetic factors such as Y chromosome microdeletions, Congenital bilateral absence of the vas deferens (CBAVD) with cystic fibrosis, Klinefelter syndrome, and Turner syndrome.

Infertility can be familial. In some cases, genetic diseases that cause infertility may not have arisen in anyone else in the family other than the person.

For the diagnosis of infertility, family members must be evaluated by an obstetrician and urologist. It will be beneficial for families diagnosed with infertility to apply to a genetic center along with other evaluation results before the treatment process starts, and to plan genetic evaluations in terms of both determining the cause and having a healthy child in the family.

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
